



District-reported 2004 results

Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher and counselor earned between \$4,057 and \$4,325 in additional salary.

Performance

- The District accomplished most of its goals, which were based on school and individual performance.
- Elementary-school students improved reading, spelling, and writing skills based on standardized and school tests.
- Middle-school students improved reading or math skills as measured by standardized test scores.
- High-school students improved reading and writing skills as measured on district pre- and post-tests.
- Most teachers participated in professional development and leadership activities, documented contacts with parents, and provided at least 25 hours of tutoring each.

Menu

- Monies were used primarily to increase eligible employee compensation.
- 1 5th-grade teacher was hired to reduce class sizes from 29 to 23 students.
- Through dropout prevention summer-school classes, students earned 23 credits of math, 7.5 credits of social studies, and 10.5 credits of English toward graduation.
