



Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher, librarian, speech pathologist, and counselor earned between \$5,926 and \$6,866 in additional salary.

Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were similar to the prior fiscal year's goals and were based on school and individual performance.
- Student achievement goals were tied to schools' AZ LEARNS labels and standardized test results.
- Other goals were linked to student attendance, dropout rates, and parent-student satisfaction.

Menu

- Monies were primarily used to increase eligible employee compensation.
- To reduce class size, the District employed 12 teachers to teach core classes and 24 instructional aides.
- 54 teachers provided AIMS intervention activities to over 1,800 students.
- 8 teachers participated in professional development activities focusing on researchbased instructional strategies.
- Approximately 575 students were impacted by dropout prevention activities.
