



Proposition 301 expenditures were 4.96 percent of the District's \$26,672,990 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

### District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher received between \$2,270 and \$3,270 in additional compensation.
- AIMS Intervention activities included intersession and after-school programs, and hiring AIMS coordinators and reading specialists at 2 schools.
- Teachers and instructional aides were hired to reduce class sizes in particular grades and subjects.
- 15 students, who would otherwise be suspended or expelled, received instruction in an alternate setting. The number of long-term suspended or expelled students declined from 20 to 2.
- The Turning Points Program helped 6 of 12 students be promoted from the 8th grade.
- Staff development facilitators were hired to coach new and returning teachers.
