



Proposition 301 expenditures were 5.46 percent of the District's \$145,869,916 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

#### District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher, counselor, and librarian earned between \$2,492 and \$4,178 in additional compensation.
- 3 teachers provided training and technical assistance in reading, writing, and math to 30 schools. Monies also paid for professional development programs geared toward AIMS intervention.
- Maximum class sizes in grades K-6 were reduced by 2 students per teacher.
- Elementary counselors were added to schools.
- A grade 7 through 12 alternative program, Crossroads, served 50 students who were long-term suspended or wanted an alternative setting.
- A teacher induction program was added to train, mentor, and coach new teachers.
