



# **Proposition 301**

# District-reported 2008 results

### Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher earned an additional \$3,452 in salary, and each librarian, counselor, speech pathologist, and peer collaboration teacher earned between \$1,749 and \$2,953 in additional salary.

### Performance

- The District accomplished most of its goals, which were based on school and individual performance.
- The goals called for students to improve scores on standardized tests and district assessments.
- The high school's attendance rate was at least 94 percent and the dropout and graduation rates improved from the previous year.
- Teachers maintained an attendance rate of at least 90 percent for the year.
- Leadership goals required teachers to supervise at least 6 events or sponsor a school club.
- Other goals were linked to parent-student satisfaction, teacher evaluations, and professional development.
