



Proposition 301 expenditures were 5.08 percent of the District's \$402,443,167 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher earned an additional \$4,556 in compensation.
- AIMS intervention activities included additional reading, math, and writing instruction outside of school hours and tutoring during the school day.
- Dropout prevention monies were used to expand alternative academic settings and provide mentoring and counseling programs for students at risk of dropping out of school.
- 28 schools hired certified teachers and 25 schools hired instructional aides to reduce class size.
- 44 schools used teacher development monies to provide additional training on such topics as Arizona Academic Standards, effective instructional techniques, and working with at-risk students.
