



Teacher pay

• On average, each teacher, librarian, counselor, and coordinator earned an additional \$8,450 in salary.

Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were similar to the prior fiscal year's goals and were based on district and individual performance.
- Freshman students showed a 10 percent improvement in reading scores and an 88 percent improvement in math scores on district pre- and post-tests.
- Teachers participated in professional development activities, including completion of university coursework, developing and delivering trainings, and professional observation activities.
- In addition, teachers participated in mentoring and collaborative coaching of other teachers, committee leadership, and special administrative projects.

Menu

- Monies were primarily used to increase eligible employee compensation.
- The District continued to pay 7 staff members to teach 352 students at risk of dropping out using alternative delivery instruction methods.
