



Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher and counselor earned an additional \$7,892 in salary, which includes performance pay for fiscal year 2007 performance.

Performance

- The District accomplished most of its goals, which were based on district and school performance.
- Both schools met Adequate Yearly Progress objectives and were labeled "Performing" or better by ADE for AZ LEARNS.
- The dropout rate decreased by 2 percent, and the graduation rate increased by 3 percent.
- Parent involvement increased through participation in reading and math curriculum activities, and participation in parent-teacher conferences increased by 2 percent.
- Other goals were linked to student achievement, student and teacher attendance, professional development, teacher evaluations, leadership, and tutoring.
